## Goodbye, STAR Testing... Hello, CAASPP Testing!

As you may already know, we, along with thousands of schools across California, are participating in a field test of a modern assessment system designed to help shape teaching and learning in the classroom. Known as the California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress – or CAASPP – these computer-based tests, also known as SBAC (Smarter Balanced Assessment Consortium) replace the STAR program.

These tests are aligned to the Common Core State Standards for English and math, which California adopted in 2010 to describe what knowledge and skills students need to be well prepared for college and careers, no matter where they come from or where they live.

Part of the goal of the field test this year is to determine how well individual questions allow students to demonstrate what they know and still need to learn. We are also taking this opportunity to see how well our technical capabilities meet the demands of computer-based assessments and to see what resources our teachers and school may yet need.

Finally and importantly, this year also gives your student an opportunity to try out the new system without consequences. All of this combined means that we will not be capturing scores this year. Instead, we will use what we learn from this field test to help ensure a successful full launch of the system in the 2014-15 school year.

Our next step in that transition is to administer the field test to students in grades 3 - 8 from April 22 - May 16. To comply with federal regulations, our students in grades 5 and 8 will also participate in the Science test as part of the old STAR system. If you want to see what types of questions students will be asked in the new SBAC test or how the test will be presented, there is a practice test available online at http://www.cde.ca.gov/ta/tg/sa/practicetest.asp.

## Women in History Week Concludes

March 10-14 marked our annual Women's History Week at UPS and UCMS. The American Association of University Women (AAUW) and UCS PTSA hosted an amazing group of women to portray famous women in history in your child's classroom. Performers included:

- Ruby Bridges Performed by LaSonia Davis Spent a year in school alone because Caucasian parents wouldn't allow their children to go to school with an African American child during the first days of court ordered integration. Students learned of her experiences as a child and how what she is doing was influenced by her childhood experience.
- Jan Brett Performed by Charmon Evans Is a popular modern author of favorite children's literature. Students learned about her interest in being an illustrator from the time she was in kindergarten, her travels, and several of her books, like The Mitten and The Hat.
- Elma Gonzales Performed by Suzy Maraboto Grew up as part of a migrant family and wanted to go to school but couldn't because no bus would come to pick her up. As a result, she did not start school until age 9. The students learned how she became a well-known professor at UCLA in science through effort and determination.
- Annie Lee Performed by Stephanie Williams is a popular African American artist whose paintings are about everyday life. Students learned how she took a chance at age 40 by doing what she had always dreamed of rather than just working at an ordinary job. She became one of the most successful African American artists to ever life.
- **Deborah Samson Performed by Amy Wallace** Disguised herself as a man and enlisted as a soldier in the Revolutionary War. Students learned what she did during her time in the military and also how it was discovered that she was a woman.
- Susan B. Anthony Performed by Mary Adler Was one of the most influential people in the Women's Right Movement and helping secure the right for women to vote. Students learned what how hard it was to make this happen.
- Mary Pickersgill Performed by Angelica Rodriguez Students will saw a 42-foot strip of fabric the size of one stripe of the flag that Mary Pickersgill sewed by hand. This flag, which flew over Fort McHenry, inspired the writing of the Star Spangled Banner.
- Sacagawea Performed by Caroline Chey The only woman for the majority of time traveling with the Lewis and Clark expedition from Fort Mandan, North Dakota to the Pacific Ocean. Students learned how she helped members of the expedition find edible and medicinal plants, how she saved valuables when a canoe tipped over, and how she helped get horses and other supplies for the expedition.
- Eugenie Clark Performed by Anita Scott Achieved her three dreams. She walked on the ocean floor, swam with the sharks, and become a teacher. She still is active in oceanographic research with a focus on sharks.
